One of my favorite genres in literature is "stunt non-fiction." The genre, as the name suggests, is characterized by an author taking on a change in their life-style (thus stunt) and journaling about the process, the hardships, the triumphs and the results. The stunt usually lasts from a month or up to a year. Among a few of my favorite books are

The Year of Living Biblically, One Man's Quest to Follow the Bible as Literally as Possible, by A.J. Jacobs.

Not Buying It, My Year without Shopping, by Judith Levine

The Happiness Project, Or Why I Spent a Year Trying to Sing in the Morning, Clean My Closets, Fight Right, Read Aristotle, and Generally Have More Fun, by Gretchen Rubin

Animal, Vegetable and Miracle: A Year of Food Life, by Barbara Kingsolver (on only eating and buying locally produced food).

I like Stunt Non-Fiction because it seems to me at its very heart is a religious and/or spiritual quest – the quest to live by a particular discipline in order to find deeper meaning, understanding and contentment in life. The books above have motivated me, entertained me, and changed me and the way I lead my life.

One of the things that I particularly like about the New Year is that it is an invitation to take on a new meaningful "stunt". I know for myself, no matter how wonderful the holiday season has been, I am always thinking of what I might prefer or tweak for the following year. And in the same way, as the New Year approaches, it is a perfect invitation to think about the year gone by and what has been meaningful and what might need to change with the ever-changing circumstances of our own lives.

I invite you to think about what stunt you might like to pull off in the New Year. If you like the idea, but you are not sure what you would like to do – here are a few of ideas for you think about:

- * read the Bible
- * meditate for 10 minutes a day
- * take 10,000 steps a day
- * write a book (writing 1667 words a day to get to 50,000 by the end of the month)

ORGANIST SEARCH COMMITTEE


The Search Committee has met with a well qualified candidate and conducted a formal interview and audition.

In this season of giving, generosity and concern for others, it's a good time to reflect on how our parish helps others less fortunate. Outlined briefly here are three of our major

outreach programs that provide food, fellowship, clothes, and entertainment to neighbors both far and near. Thankfully, many of you are involved in helping with one or more of these activities. Some of you perhaps are just thinking about what you might be able to do to help so we hope the brief descriptions below will assist you and cement your New Year's resolutions to volunteer. The Vestry outreach committee consists of Joan Clark, Barbara Gardner and Frankie Gartner. Next month we will profile some of the grants we give and how they help the organizations we assist.

Food Outreach – Panera Pick-up and Delivery, Ministry to Local Food Pantries and Shelter Home-Cooked and Served Meals, Clothing/Donations Outreach - Stockings for Hope and Food, Fun and Fellowship Outreach with B-Safe

Every Friday morning (or late Thursday evening) a St. Michael's volunteer picks up Panera's Milford donations for that day that include boxed pastries and baked goods that remain unused. The amount varies from a few bags to filling up an entire SUV. We then deliver them to the women's shelter in Hopkinton who have a walk-in freezer and can freeze bread or rolls to be used at a later time. Currently there are 9 volunteers which means each person is responsible for a shift every 8 weeks or so. Contact Joan Clark, joan.clark.mail@comcast.com if you want to help in this way.

Each month we collect food for a different local town's Food Pantry. Parishioners bring the food to church during the month and on the last Sunday of each month, parishioners from the town receiving the food take two baskets to the front of the sanctuary to be blessed. When it's time for your town to receive the food, let Joan know if you'd like to help with the blessing of the baskets at joan.clark.mail@comcast.com.

Each month October through June, men and women from St. Michael's prepare and serve home cooked meals for two shelters, Serenity House in Hopkinton the second Monday of the month (about 30 women) and Shadows in Ashland (about 20-24 women) the first Wednesday of the month. Reminders are sent out by Amy, our church secretary. Volunteers sign up for either an entrée for 10-15 people, a salad or a dessert and the schedule is set for the year in advance. Usually one or two of the people cooking also stay for fellowship and to help serve.


Many volunteers commit to more than one month and sometimes emergencies happen so we always need additional cooks to fill in. It's a win-win for everyone – the volunteers enjoy cooking and/or serving and the women at the shelters love the home-cooked food and the chance to gather together for friendship and community building. 
Our Stockings for Hope is in full swing, with donations due at the church by December 14. This is our annual Christmas-oriented outreach where requested donations are assembled and brought by bag to the two shelters we serve, Serenity House and Shadows. It's another way to underscore our connection with the women at the shelters we serve in other ways, spread a little Christmas cheer and provide them with items they need but might not otherwise receive. B-Safe is a multi-faceted outreach activity that brings together St. Michael's and children from the city in a safe, fun and enriching program that is sponsored and supported by St. Stephen's Youth Programs and runs during the summer in several locations throughout the state by individual parishes or combinations of parishes. 55 parishes in Massachusetts provide volunteers, lunches and field trips to elementary and middle school students from Boston and Chelsea and we are proud to be one of the 55. Usually held in late July, snacks and lunches are made, transportation is arranged and activities are planned for our field trip with the students to Hopkinton State Park. Many of our families attend and volunteer and everyone comes away from the two day experience with a smile on their faces. Plans are already in the works for the 2015 summer B-Safe experience. On Sunday, March 1 from 1-3 PM, there will be a planning meeting for B-Safe Partner Leaders at The Church of the Redeemer in Chestnut Hill. The 2015 summer B-Safe program will be discussed along with some preliminary planning. If you're interested in attending and/or taking a leadership role this coming year, please join Frankie Gartner who ran the program last year for the first time.
