From the Rector

It is hard to believe that the Fall is on its way. Along with the Fall being a time of Back to School and Back to Church for many people, it is also a time when we turn our thoughts to stewardship — and in the plainest terms: giving money to the church to support its work for the upcoming year. As a New Englander there is probably nothing that I dislike more than talking about money. I am sure I was taught somewhere along the way that talking about money is gauche, a little embarrassing and uncomfortable. Quite frankly, the question that most clergy dread in their interviews for new positions is the question, "What is your experience of stewardship?" Most clergy would prefer to leave the topic of money alone altogether. Pastoral Care and Worship are safer topics that seem more Godly, however...

I was reading recently that in the Bible you will find the word "believe" is used 273 times, the word "pray" is used 371 times, "love" is used 714 times and the word "give" – well, that comes in at 2,172 occurrences. Giving back to God in the form of a tithe is a fundamental Biblical principle. The term tithe has traditionally meant 10% of your income – but some people claim that 5% makes a pretty decent tithe too. Percentages are helpful, but in a way, stewardship is a very personal matter – 10% for some is far too little, and for others, in their present circumstances, 10% would be crippling. For each of us, we have to ask ourselves, "what is asking me to do this year in my financial commitment to my church and the kingdom of God?"

This Fall we are looking for a new stewardship chair to help organize a stewardship committee and campaign. If you feel called to this ministry please see Dana Frye, our Senior Warden, who is willing to work side by side with you throughout the stewardship campaign (which runs generally from the mid-October to mid-November).

Also, this Fall there are two great resources available to help us in our Stewardship Campaign – starting on September 12th from 9 AM to 1 PM at Church of the Holy Spirit, Mattapan, there will be a "God the Giver" workshop which aims at strengthening, or starting, the congregation's annual pledge campaign. I will be attending this resource day and would be delighted to have anyone join me who is interested in helping out with Stewardship. The second event coincides with Applefest. On October 3rd, from 9 AM to 2 PM there will be a Diocesan Resource Day at Bentley University in Waltham. The focus of this day will be youth ministry, leadership, communications, social media, and financial stewardship. Again, if interested, please see me.

THE KOSHYS – FROM INDIA WITH LOVE

Many of us have come to know the composed, quiet, and dignified presence of Tom and Gracy Koshy in our midst, whether being greeted at the door by Tom on Sunday mornings or beholding Gracy's gorgeous smile. The Koshys have been worshipping at St. Michael's since 2002, on the recommendation of friends and have been active and enthusiastic parishioners ever since. When asked what they like about our church community, they describe it as warm and welcoming with no internal strife and as having a strong outreach program that they hope will become even stronger. Tom has served in many capacities on the Vestry, Rector Search Committee, as well as Eucharistic Minister, Stewardship Committee Chair, and Usher.

Tom participated in the annual *Walk For Hunger* for 23 years, raising money for *Project Bread*. The couple delivers meals every Tuesday for the elderly in Hopkinton (*Meals on Wheels*) and collects food from the *Panera Bread* restaurant in Milford for Serenity House in Hopkinton.

Their association with the Anglican Church is a long and interesting one. Tom's grandfather in the state of Kerala, India, bought land and built the then Anglican (now Church of South India) parish in his hometown. Six generations of his family have been an integral part of the Anglican Church, and then the Church of South India which is the union of the Anglican, Presbyterian, Congregational, and Methodist faiths.

Grace and Tom both grew up in Kerala (Kerala means the land of coconut trees), a tiny strip of land on the southwest side of India by the Arabian side. Gracy describes Kerala as being very similar to Hawaii, which the couple visited last year.

There is a strong and long tradition of Christianity in Kerala. Apostle Thomas brought Christianity to Kerala in 52 A.D. About 20 percent of the population in Kerala are Christians, compared to only 2 percent in India

Another strong thread of influence running through their lives was the importance of education. Tom and Gracy both hold advanced degrees – Tom holds a Ph. D. in Mathematics and Gracy a Masters in Chemistry. After graduate work in Kerala, he taught there for 3 years and then came to Boston University

CHURCH SCHOOL: CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

We want to make our wonderful program, the *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd*, accessible to all children at St. Michael's. We consider *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd* to be outstanding, and the best formation in faith that we can offer our children. The *Catechesis* program is designed to enable children to recognize and develop the experience of God that they already possess. It introduces the language, symbols and practices of worship as well as the stories of the Bible and Church history.

This program would not be possible without the remarkable commitment of our dedicated Church School teachers, who are in the atrium classrooms almost every Sunday of the school year. Since our volunteer Lead Teachers need assistance, we ask parents to volunteer. We have flexible volunteer requirements and ask parents with one child to help in the classroom for at least four Sundays during the Church School year. We hope that parents who have more than one child in *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd* will volunteer more often. Depending upon what best fits your schedule, you may volunteer for consecutive Sundays or for staggered Sundays during the year.

If you cannot assist in the classroom on Sunday mornings, there are other ways you can help the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program. While the program cannot exist without the help of parent volunteers, our first priority is the spiritual wellbeing of all children in our parish, including children whose parents may not be able to volunteer.

If circumstances prevent you from assisting in any way this year, we still encourage you to register your children for the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program.



Registration

Registration for Church School is available both by email and in person. Parents of returning Church School students may register by email



(stmichholl@aol.com) from August 31 onwards.

Registration for new Church School students will be held at St. Michael's on Sunday, September 13 from 9:15 to 9:45 AM and from 11:15 AM onwards.

Registration remains open throughout the school year. If your child is not yet ready to join *Catechesis* of the Good Shepherd in September, he or she may join in the fall, winter, or spring. Even if your child misses a number of classes, all classes your children are able to attend will help them benefit from the *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd* program.

Catechesis Levels

In the **Level I Atrium** (for 3 to 6 year olds), The lead teacher in the atrium will be announced very soon. This atrium is in the upstairs classroom at the front of the building.

The **Level II Atrium** (for children entering 1st through 3rd grade) is in the Stephen Hagen Atrium downstairs. Mike Teuber will be the lead assistant this year.

The **Level III Atrium** (for children entering 4th, 5th and 6th grades) meets in the upstairs classroom at the rear of the building, with Kristen Walters as lead teacher.

Classes Begin on September 20

The *Catechesis* program will begin on Sunday morning, September 20 in Levels I, II and III. Please make every effort to get your children to class on time. The time is necessary to cover the wealth of material and give the children time to work with the materials presented. Late arrivals can be disrupting to other children and the teachers.

JOURNEY TO ADULTHOOD PROGRAMS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

This year at St. Michael's our Youth Program will consist of Rite 13, Confirmation, and Young Adults in Church. A description of each course is detailed below. In addition to these classes our program will be augmented with additional youth fellowship opportunities and the planning of a mission trip for the summer of 2016. Youth registration will take place following the 10 AM Service on September 13.



Youth Sundays Worship

Our young people are an important part of the St. Michael's community – and their presence in worship enriches them and all of us. This year we plan exciting Youth Sundays, when young people in Rite-13 and Confirmation will not have classes but instead will participate in the Eucharist at 10 AM. This will provide a chance for those who wish to serve as ushers, greeters, lectors or Eucharistic Ministers. The sermon will aim to address issues of interest to teens as well as adults. Youth Sundays will usually take place on the first Sunday of every month, starting in October with Blessing of the Animals on October 4.

Rite-13 for 6th & 7th grades - Meets during the 10 AM Service (youth returns at Eucharist)

Our Rite-13 group will continue this September for young people in grades 6 and 7. Rite-13 is the first two-year phase of the Journey to Adulthood youth education program, widely recognized as an excellent program providing a Christian foundation for young people as they prepare for successful adulthood.

The Rite-13 group will meet from 9:45 to 10:40 on Sunday mornings. The Rite-13 program addresses four themes – self, society, spirituality, and sexuality – through Bible study, group discussions and special extracurricular activities. Look for further information about Rite-13 at Celebration Sunday on September 13, including plans for the upcoming year.

Confirmation Class 2016 for 8th, 9th, & 10th grades - *Meets Sunday at 11:30 AM or 6:30 PM*Our Confirmation course will examine what it means to be a Christian, an Episcopalians and invites participants to examine what a Christian Community does and means.

Young Adults in Church (YAC) - Gathers the first Sunday of each month at 11:30 AM

This programs supports older teens (10th, 11th, 12th grades) discern and carry out a ministry within our church or in the larger community. Vocation and development of a personal credo are emphasized. A final rite of passage sends them out into the world as ambassadors of Christ.

in 1967 for his doctorate. He had met Gracy who was a neighbor of his first cousin in a town about 12 miles from his own, two weeks prior to leaving for the U.S. A week later, they got married. She stayed behind, but not for long. After securing admission and scholarship at Boston College, Gracy joined him nine months later.

Tom's intention was to return to India after completing his degree. But the couple already had their first child and there were many more opportunities here than in Kerala. Tom says, the decision was very hard on his father. In 1970, he joined the faculty at Framingham State University and remained there for 40 years, retiring in 2011. Tom would never tell anyone this, but he is the author of several math textbooks and numerous mathematical articles. After receiving a second Masters in Chemistry, Gracy worked initially in the Genetics Lab at Children's Hospital, Boston. She eventually received a degree in computer science from Framingham State, working at Prime Computer for 5 years and Tufts Health for 18 years, retiring in 2013.

Their married life has taken them from a dorm for married graduate students in Boston to apartments in Jamaica Plain and Framingham Center, to a house in Holliston for 13 years, and to their present house in Hopkinton. They have two grown-up children, a son in Baltimore with a nine- year-old boy and a daughter in Houston who has a six-year-old girl. They visit them often as well as returning to India to see family and friends. They enjoy traveling, socializing with friends, attending cultural events, and of course, gardening.

When asked to reveal one thing about each of them no one at St. Michael's would know, Gracy revealed she hates to cook and Tom shared that he was on the college field-hockey team for three years. We are lucky indeed to have this intelligent and gracious couple so much a part of our special church community.

The *OTHER* side of Roy, the 'outside of church' Roy, has been involved in music theater ever since college. So there you have it – the *OTHER* side! And we don't know what adventure awaits!




APPLEFEST – MARK YOUR CALENDARS
